After spending four months upgrading the camping ground with new amenities, driveways and power sites it opened for business on Friday, November 11.

"This gave us a week to figure out how to run the site before 100 people turned up for Toast Martinborough weekend," Frank

People have come from all over Europe, North America, Australia and Israel but the British and the Germans account for over 60 percent of international guest nights.

He said the big-event weekends are important but the vast majority of visitors come to Martinborough to taste the wine, eat in one of the township's restaurants, enjoy the scenery and just relax.

Frank and Lisa have taken just four days off since July and as the summer season comes to an end there is no sign of that changing.

"Obviously it will be quieter over winter but we still expect to see the campervans coming through and there a lot of improvements we still want to make."

Landscaping is a priority and the couple have planted nearly 30 trees so far - olives, cabbage trees, kowhai and gums - and are now turning their attention to borders, hedging

and grasses.

The office is nearly completed and the next step is to provide wire less Internet for guests.

"Camping has moved on since we were kids and it's amazing how many people have their laptops with them," Frank said.

"We will provide Internet access in the office but increasingly peopl expect to be able to use their own laptops in the comfort of their cam ervan so we need to make sure we're ready for them."
